100th anniversary Congress of the Swiss Abroad

The 2024 Congress of the Swiss Abroad was a singular event: it was the 100th edition. While the Congress has evolved over the years, its core mission remains the same: to unite the Swiss Abroad and raise awareness of their specific needs. The Congress of the Swiss Abroad that took place from 11-13 July in Lucerne, marked the 100th time that Swiss citizens living abroad met in Switzerland.

The idea of fostering closer ties between the Swiss Abroad and their homeland emerged in the context of the First World War through the initiative of the New Helvetic Society, which still exists today. The first meeting took place in April 1918. The centenary edition is being celebrated in 2024, rather than 2018, due to interruptions caused by the Second World War and, more recently, the Covid-19 pandemic. The event's enduring spirit remains a testament to its historical significance.

The Congress serves dual purposes. It's a social gathering for Swiss expatriates to share experiences and maintain connections; and it's a political platform for addressing the interests of the Swiss Abroad. This political dimension is managed by the Council of the Swiss Abroad, which traditionally holds one of its two annual sessions during the Congress. Australian delegates Carmen Trochsler, Beat Knoblauch and Roland Isler were there to represent our part of the world.

This 100th edition is also an opportunity to look to the future. In just over a century, the very face of the Swiss diaspora has changed. At the time of the first Congress, people who emigrated were seen as people who would never return to Switzerland again. But now, many of them are much more mobile. They sometimes go abroad for professional reasons and regularly commute between Switzerland and their country of residence. They are no longer people who have left Switzerland for good, but people who can return. Modern means of communication have also changed the situation. Even when living on the other side of the world, it is possible to have instant contact with loved ones in

Switzerland or to keep up-to-date on what is happening in their home country. This raises the question of whether a large annual meeting such as the Congress is still useful.

Humans are by definition social beings. People who take part in the Congress enjoy seeing each other and talking to each other. The pandemic has shown that the new communication tools cannot completely replace face-to-face meetings. Attending conferences can also be an opportunity to get immersed in the Swiss atmosphere. One can

follow what's going on in Switzerland from a distance, but there will always be added value to experience the Swiss reality in Switzerland.

The fact remains, however, that attendance is down. Importantly also, it is an increasingly expensive undertaking to stage an event of that size and financial support from sponsors has declined. This has resulted in the OSA Board announcing at the Council meeting that the Congress will no longer take place every year. What shape the event will be in the future and its frequency is yet to be determined.

The Council of the Swiss Abroad (CSA)

The CSA consists of a network of 140 delegates, 20 from within Switzerland and 120 from abroad. It is a key institution for the Swiss diaspora, playing a crucial role in connecting Switzerland and its citizens around the world, and in advocating for your interests, rights, and welfare.

The CSA's work extends beyond political advocacy to issues such as ensuring that the Swiss Abroad are supported by providing relevant information and advice, fostering a connected Swiss community, or in times of emergency. Its lobbying efforts aim to elevate the voice of the diaspora within Swiss federal politics, ensuring that your concerns are addressed and contributions recognised.

As a Swiss residing in any of the above-mentioned countries, you are part of a global community that the members of CSA work tirelessly to connect and defend. It's through the Council's efforts that the unique challenges and opportunities facing Swiss expatriates are brought to the forefront of the Swiss national discourse. The CSA's commitment to your representation and welfare exemplifies the strength and unity of the Swiss community across borders and strengthens the bond between Switzerland and its citizens abroad.

The CSA's dedication to increasing political participation among the Swiss Abroad is demonstrated through its advocacy for the introduction of e-voting. Initiatives such as the direct democratic election of its delegates further underscores its commitment to inclusiveness and representation.

Election of delegates (and deputy) representing Australia, Kiribati, Nauru, Papua New Guinea, Solomon Islands and Vanuatu

Based on the number of registered Swiss living in our region – about 26,550 – Australia* holds four seats on the Council. Delegates are elected for a term of four years; the current term will expire in August 2025.

The four candidates receiving the highest number of votes will be elected as full members of the CSA. Provided the mandate is accepted, the candidate with the fifth highest number of votes will be elected deputy. If the mandate is refused, it shall go to the candidate next in line. The deputy has full voting rights at Council meetings when deputising for a CSA delegate. The deputy is also encouraged to cooperate in CSA tasks as required. Should a seat become vacant mid-term, the deputy can assume the position of elected delegate for the remainder of the term.

Direct election via e-voting

The election next year will be carried out entirely by electronic means (e-voting), using a Swiss e-voting system. This will ensure that every eligible Swiss citizen will have the possibility to choose their representatives.

The election will be conducted by the **Swiss Alliance Australia Inc (SAA)** on behalf of the Organisation of the Swiss Abroad (OSA), with the assistance of the Swiss Federal Government and the Consulate General of Switzerland in Sydney. The election coordinator is Claude Alain Staub, member of the SAA committee.

Who can vote?

To be eligible to vote you must:

- be a Swiss citizen residing in Australia*
- be 18 years and over
- be registered with the Consulate General of Switzerland in Sydney
- have a current email address

Ensure the Consulate General has your up-to-date details!

Call for candidates to stand for election

To be an elected delegate or deputy delegate to the Council of the Swiss Abroad is a rewarding and important voluntary role serving your community. Anyone that fulfils the following eligibility criteria is strongly encouraged to apply standing for election.

To be eligible to stand for election, candidates must:

- be a Swiss citizen (or dual citizen) living in Australia*
- be 18 years and over
- be registered with the Consulate General of Switzerland in Sydney
- demonstrate an interest and commitment to the Swiss community in Australia*
- be prepared to serve for the term 2025–2029
- have an interest in the Swiss political process, i.e. be enrolled to vote in Switzerland
- in addition to English, be fluent in either German or French (spoken and written)
- be willing to travel to Switzerland for Council meetings once or twice a year (at own travel and accommodation expenses), and attend other online meetings as required
- be prepared to fulfil the duties and responsibilities of a Council member as stated in the OSA Duty List (Pflichtenheft/Cahier des charges) – a copy of which is available on www.swissallianceaustralia.org
- be prepared to be a non-executive committee member of the Swiss Alliance Australia Inc

How to apply to stand as a candidate

If you meet the above qualifications and would like to apply to stand for election, please go to the SAA website www.swissallianceaustralia.org and download an application form. The completed application must be received by the election coordinator, Claude Alain Staub, on president@swissallianceaustralia.org by **no later than COB 31 January 2025**.

The past months have brought several changes in the leadership of both the Swiss Embassy and the Swiss Consulate General. Since January 2024, Tristan Piguet reinforced the embassy as its new Science Councilor.

In Sydney, Consul General Rolf Frei completed his temporary assignment and left for his new mandate in Cape Town, South Africa. He passed the baton to Consul General Elisabeth Bösch Malinen, who arrived in September. It is her third assignment as Consul General after having led the representations in Montreal and in Munich. Elisabeth is an experienced colleague who has served in many countries, including one term in Canberra (2003-2006). We are also happy to welcoming Delphine Quack, Daniela Hayoz and Sangeetha Wickramasingam to the consular team in Sydney.

Swiss Australian collaboration in forensic science – a longstanding success story

Forensic science is often portrayed in popular culture, but few realize Australia and Switzerland are leaders in the field, with a close collaboration driving their success. A key event highlighting this was the 23rd International Association of Forensic Sciences (IAFS) meeting in Sydney last November, where over 1,700 delegates from 70 countries, including many Swiss experts, gathered. The event showcased Australia and New Zealand's forensic expertise and marked the presidency of Professor Claude Roux from the University of Technology Sydney (UTS), reflecting the strong Swiss influence.

Claude Roux, originally from Lausanne, Switzerland, studied forensic science at the University of Lausanne (UNIL), which established the first forensic science school in 1909. Moving to Australia 28 years ago, he developed the country's first undergraduate and PhD forensic science programs and became a leader in the field, founding the UTS Centre for Forensic Science, an internationally recognised centre of excellence in this field. His students now work across various sectors in Australia and overseas.

Roux's mentor, Professor Pierre Margot, also made significant contributions to forensic science in Australia. After joining the Australian National University in 1983, he led the development of the widely used Polilight lamp with the Australian Federal Police. Margot returned to Switzerland in 1986 to lead the Institut de Police Scientifique et Criminologie, bringing his PhD student, Chris Lennard, who later became a key figure in Australia's forensic science community. Lennard and Roux have collaborated throughout their careers, with Lennard serving as Chair of the Scientific Committee at the recent IAFS meeting.

The partnership between UTS and UNIL adopts a holistic approach, treating forensic science as a distinct, science-based discipline focused on the study of remnants (traces) of past events. Their collaboration has led to many joint projects, student exchanges, and advances in areas like forensic intelligence, fingerprints, evidence evaluation, and drug detection. This cooperation extends beyond academia, involving law enforcement in both countries. Swiss graduates now work in Australian law enforcement, and some Australians have continued their careers in Switzerland.

As crime evolves, forensic science must adapt. To support this, Australian and Swiss scientists co-developed the Sydney Declaration, a framework defining forensic science and its fundamental tenets. This declaration provides a scientific foundation for the field, helping shape its modern ecosystem.

Looking ahead, the collaboration between Australia and Switzerland is set to grow. UTS and UNIL recently renewed their partnership, with new universities from the UK, Canada, and the USA joining the effort. This global alliance aims to further advance forensic science worldwide.

The Sydney Declaration

The Sydney Declaration is a key framework developed to establish a comprehensive and modern foundation for forensic science. It emerged from collaborative efforts among Australian and Swiss forensic scientists, alongside other international experts, in the lead up to the 23rd triennial meeting of the International Association of Forensic Sciences (IAFS) in Sydney.

The main aim of the Sydney Declaration is to define forensic science across all sub-disciplines (a transversal approach) and to articulate its foundational principles. This is significant because forensic science is a diverse field encompassing many specialised areas, such as DNA analysis, toxicology, digital forensics, and fingerprinting, each with its own methodologies and challenges. The Declaration provides a cohesive, science-based framework to unify these areas through their foundational basis and allows forensic science to be more relevant, effective and reliable in a rapidly changing world.
