The value of the Swiss Abroad

What are the Swiss Abroad worth to Switzerland? Thoughts on that topic by Beat Knoblauch, delegate to the Council of the Swiss Abroad and Prof Dr Gianny D'Amato, Director, Swiss Forum for Migration and Population Studies, University of Neuchâtel.

Dear Professor D'Amato,

I listened with great interest to your expose on migration and saw the many graphs, figures, underlining the importance of the issue of Swiss migration. Time did not allow for some questions or discussions, although the topic continues to be relevant to the Swiss Abroad.

Of late, some negative sentiments were mirrored in the Swiss Media, especially about AHV payments to the

Swiss Abroad (and not paying thereon tax in CH). There are other bad will examples, perhaps jealously motivated, but it is not deniable that the Swiss Abroad have been vocal in their demands, such as for e-voting, representation, etc. But this is not the reason for my approach to you.

What the discussion should focus on is much more on the value-added component the Swiss Abroad bring to Switzerland. The amount of goodwill created, opportunities offered, spread of Swiss culture, ethics, arguing for democratic procedures in politics and in everyday life, development work, environmental assessments, scholarly pursuits, they are all perfect examples of achievements of the Swiss Abroad, from which Switzerland benefits to some extent. Yet, this very extent is the million-dollar question, how can it be measured and assessed?

I have no immediate solution on how to measure that phenomenon, but I would have liked to ask you this question in Lucerne. I have previously mentioned or put this question forward at Council meetings, but to no avail, it is a difficult one.

A serious attempt to assess this value adding function would already be a step in the right direction, in as much as it starts the discussion in a (for the Swiss Abroad) positive manner. The Media would then hopefully follow this trail.

Dear Professor D'Amato, I value very much your academic work on the subject of migration and I hope you find time and resources to work on this value-added aspect.

Thank you for reaching out and for your kind words regarding my presentation at the 100th Congress of the Swiss Abroad. I appreciate your engagement and your thoughtful reflections on the topic of Swiss migration.

The topic of quantifying the value added by the Swiss Abroad is indeed pertinent and complex. The contributions you mentioned, such as fostering goodwill, promoting Swiss culture, and advocating for democratic principles, are invaluable. However, as you pointed out, measuring and assessing these

contributions poses a significant challenge.

I agree that a serious attempt to assess this value-added function would be beneficial, both for understanding the impact of the Swiss Abroad and for positively shaping the ongoing discussion. Your suggestion to focus on this aspect is timely and relevant, and I appreciate your efforts to bring this to the attention of the Council.

I will certainly discuss this idea with my colleagues and experts in the field to explore potential approaches for evaluating these contributions. It is an important discussion that merits further exploration, and I am hopeful that we can identify some meaningful steps forward.

Thank you again for your interest and for highlighting this crucial aspect of Swiss migration.

The Council of the Swiss Abroad (CSA)

The CSA consists of a network of 140 delegates, 20 from within Switzerland and 120 from abroad. It is a key institution for the Swiss diaspora, playing a crucial role in connecting Switzerland and its citizens around the world, and in advocating for your interests, rights, and welfare.

The CSA's work extends beyond political advocacy to issues such as ensuring that the Swiss Abroad are supported by providing relevant information and advice, fostering a connected Swiss community, or in times of emergency. Its lobbying efforts aim to elevate the voice of the diaspora within Swiss federal politics, ensuring that your concerns are addressed and contributions recognised.

As a Swiss residing in any of the above-mentioned countries, you are part of a global community that the members of CSA work tirelessly to connect and defend. It's through the Council's efforts that the unique challenges and opportunities facing Swiss expatriates are brought to the forefront of the Swiss national discourse. The CSA's commitment to your representation and welfare exemplifies the strength and unity of the Swiss community across borders and strengthens the bond between Switzerland and its citizens abroad.

The CSA's dedication to increasing political participation among the Swiss Abroad is demonstrated through its advocacy for the introduction of e-voting. Initiatives such as the direct democratic election of its delegates further underscores its commitment to inclusiveness and representation.

Election of delegates (and deputy) representing Australia, Kiribati, Nauru, Papua New Guinea, Solomon Islands and Vanuatu

Based on the number of registered Swiss living in our region – about 26,550 – Australia* holds four seats on the Council. Delegates are elected for a term of four years; the current term will expire in August this year.

The four candidates receiving the highest number of votes will be elected as full members of the CSA. Provided the mandate is accepted, the candidate with the fifth highest number of votes will be elected deputy. If the mandate is refused, it shall go to the candidate next in line. The deputy has full voting rights at Council meetings when deputising for a CSA delegate. The deputy is also encouraged to cooperate in CSA tasks as required. Should a seat become vacant mid-term, the deputy can assume the position of elected delegate for the remainder of the term.

Direct election via e-voting

The election next year will be carried out entirely by electronic means (e-voting), using a Swiss e-voting system. This will ensure that every eligible Swiss citizen will have the possibility to choose their representatives.

The election will be conducted by the Swiss Alliance Australia Inc (SAA) on behalf of the Organisation of the Swiss Abroad (OSA), with the assistance of the Swiss Federal Government (FDFA) and the Consulate General of Switzerland in Sydney. The election coordinator is Claude Alain Staub, former SAA president and current committee member.

Who can vote?

To be eligible to vote you must:

- be a Swiss citizen residing in Australia*;
- be 18 years and over;
- be registered with the Swiss Consulate General in Sydney;
- have a current email address.

Ensure the Consulate General has your up-to-date details!

Call for candidates to stand for election

To be an elected delegate or deputy delegate to the Council of the Swiss Abroad is a rewarding and important voluntary role serving your community.

Anyone that fulfils the following eligibility criteria is strongly encouraged to apply standing for election.

To be eligible to stand for election, candidates must:

- be a Swiss citizen (or dual citizen) living in Australia*;
- be 18 years and over;
- be registered with the Swiss Consulate General in Sydney;
- demonstrate an interest and commitment to the Swiss community in Australia*;
- be prepared to serve for the term 2025–2029;
- have an interest in the Swiss political process, i.e. be enrolled to vote in Switzerland;
- in addition to English, be fluent in either German or French (spoken and written);
- be willing to travel to Switzerland for Council meetings once or twice a year, at own travel and accommodation arrangements (CSA receive a modest attendance fee and expense allowance, provided the finances of the OSA allow this) and attend other online meetings as required;
- be prepared to fulfil the duties and responsibilities of a Council member as stated in the OSA Duty List (Pflichtenheft/Cahier des charges) a copy of which is available here ② www.swissallianceaustralia.org;
- be prepared to be a non-executive committee member of the Swiss Alliance Australia Inc.

How to apply to stand as a candidate

If you meet the aforementioned qualifications and would like to apply to stand for election, please go to the SAA website www.swissallianceaustralia.org and download an application form. The completed application must be received by the election coordinator, Claude Alain Staub, on info@shiftingnirvana.com by COB 15 February 2025.

Swiss connection with Antarctica

Switzerland - a Polar Nation?

Switzerland, although landlocked and thousands of kilometres from the poles began exploring the poles as far back as the 19th century.

In 1912, the Swiss meteorologist and polar researcher Alfred de Quervain led a team of explorers for the first time from West to East across the Greenland ice sheet.

The Mertz Glacier in East Antarctica, one of the research stops of the Antarctic Circumnavigation Expedition (ACE) that took place in 2016/17, is named after Swiss researcher Xavier Mertz.

Swiss excellence in polar research

Since then, the Swiss scientific community has actively participated in multinational collaborations and international science programs, becoming a world leader in the field of polar research. Swiss scientists feature among the world leaders in polar research.

Switzerland's glaciers, ice and snow have shaped the country's landscapes and people, and given rise to outstanding high-altitude research. Research on high altitude and high latitude regions is mutually beneficial; the characteristics and applications of Swiss high-altitude research bear a close resemblance to polar research.

The **Swiss** Polar Institute typifies the **Swiss** grass-roots approach to research. It is the result of an initiative passionate by and individuals dedicated who work with Swiss research institutions. The Swiss government is delighted to be able to support such initiatives.

One such dedicated scientist is Dr Jessica Studer. She is the Swiss ESA-sponsored medical doctor (MD) of DC20, the twentieth crew to spend



a winter at Concordia research station, which lies on the Dome C plateau of Antarctica **⇒** https://bit.ly/4h5onaw. Jessica has spent a winterover from 2023 to 2024 doing biomedical research in Concordia, a place more remote than the International Space Station. The Swiss Polar Institute is a good example of the many research platforms established and led by Swiss researchers, bringing together research excellence from all around the world to expand scientific knowledge.

The Mertz Fellowship program is designed to encourage the active involvement of early-career researchers in polar and high-altitude science, and to promote synergies between Swiss and Australian higher education and research institutions through scientific networking and joint projects. The Fellowship program is implemented in collaboration with the Swiss Polar Institute and managed by the Embassy of Switzerland in Australia.

Switzerland's commitment towards Antarctica

The Antarctic Treaty System entered into force in 1961. It regulates international relations with respect to Antarctica, earth's only continent without a native human population. The treaty sets aside Antarctica as a scientific preserve, establishes freedom of scientific investigation, and bans military activity on the continent. Today the treaty unites 53 parties, with Switzerland joining in 1990.

The Antarctic Treaty stipulates that Antarctica shall be used for peaceful purposes only, thus dedicating an entire continent to scientific research and international cooperation. Results from Antarctic research have to be exchanged and made widely available. The first project of the Swiss Polar Institute underlines and strengthens these endeavours.

Switzerland's involvement in the Polar Regions is part of its foreign policy objectives: Swiss science diplomacy endeavours to open doors for our researchers abroad, to contribute to the worldwide promotion of Swiss expertise in research and innovation and to create new scientific cooperation schemes worldwide.

Both the Antarctic Treaty and the Arctic Council embody objectives shared by Swiss foreign policy, namely, to actively contribute to stability and peace in the world. Science has no borders.
